## STATE OF THE BOROUGH

We are well into the 21st century but our Borough is still lingering in the past. As Council President, it is my job to take a look around and see how we can improve and become more efficient. I found that our systems, office, streets, building and parks are all in need of organization and/or upgrades. We've started to work on many of these issues behind the scenes. It's a slow process but you should all be seeing the changes little by little come to the surface. You may have noticed a couple of new faces in the office. Please help me welcome two new additions to our staff, Pat Natale and Matt Copple who are helping us to organize ourselves and move closer to a paperless office. Our records of building, zoning and health issues are the first to transition to electronic. They are all being scanned and entered into a Geo plan system. This will allow our Engineer and Inspectors instant access to all work that has been done or is in the process of being done at a particular location. And you will soon see a couple of upgrades to our building itself. In our efforts to bring the Borough facilities up to Code, we are adding some new handicap accessible doors to the Municipal center and upgrading our gymnasium bleachers which will also be accessible. I think you will be happy to know that coming soon you'll find a few new additions to our Borough. Construction will start in the Spring on Chilli's and Chick-Fil-A, new houses off of Brookhaven Rd. and Arlington Ave. and the Green Estates, a 55+ community off of Radio Park Lane. New is great, however, looking around we find that unfortunately, it seems our streets are falling apart. We've discovered that this is not a surface level issue. We enter challenging times as we witness our infrastructure reaching the ripe old age of 75 years. We are seeing more crumbling sanitary and storm sewers that need our attention. Our systems were not designed to take the kind of hard rains we now experience in the ever changing climate evolution we find ourselves in. So, we have purchased a new state-of-the-art camera that will help us to identify our problems. Because of this, we have decided to pursue a more aggressive patching and resurfacing program deferring paving to 2019.

That frees up the funds to address our underground problems this year so that we can confidently pave our streets going forward and not worry about our newly paved streets collapsing.

I do have some good news to share about Public Works and that is we are in the best shape possible in modernizing our vehicles. With all but one of our trucks still under warranty, we should experience fewer mechanical problems as winter approaches. Our leaf collection apparatus has been repaired in order to continue this great service to our residents. We will be ready to collect leaves and plow the streets as the need arises. Please review the Snow Removal Procedures and see the leaf collection schedule both contained within this newsletter and on the Borough website. Speaking of winter, this year's Christmas parade is scheduled for Saturday, November 17th. It will be dedicated to our Brookhaven businesses. The parade kicks off at 2:00 p.m. from Our Lady of Charity and works its way through Borough streets from Victor Ave., Trimble Blvd., Mt. Vernon Ave., Chandler Dr. to the grandstand located at Coebourn Elementary School. As Parade Co-Chair it is my privilege to work along-side all of our parade committee members that are made up of fellow co-chairs, Linda Riffert, Jane Chism, Ginny McKee, and Stephanie Donaway. They spend the year fundraising and organizing the event. So, come out and help us kick off the Holidays in grand style. And don't forget to join us on Friday, October 12th at the Borough Hall for Bingo with a Twist. Tickets are available at the Hall. In closing, I've been working for the Borough for More than 30 years and have been returned to Council approaching three years and although I'm working through some difficult challenges, I've always found it a privilege to serve. I have cherished working alongside a first rate Fire Department, second to none, a hard-working Public Works crew, dedicated volunteers that fill our committees, and a committed office staff, all working to make Brookhaven the best it can be. We never forget that it is you that we are here to serve. Thank you for giving us the opportunity.

The Officers and members of the Brookhaven Fire Co. would like to congratulate Firefighters Jonathan Barbosa, Jr. and Matt Copple on attaining their Fire 1 Professional Certification. All firefighters in the company also obtained Hazmat Operations Certification.

As cooler weather approaches, please ensure that all smoke detectors and CO detectors are installed and working properly. It is recommended to install a smoke detector on every level of your home and in every bedroom and a CO detector within 15 feet of each bedroom. Have your heater serviced before the cold weather comes in and change your filter and have your chimney checked for debris and cracks. As you begin your holiday decorating, check extension cords for frays and cracks before use. Take care to never overload electrical outlets or extension cords.

Brookhaven officers and members are always looking to recruit new firefighters (age 14 and over) and EMTs. You can stop by the firehouse any Tuesday night after 6PM or Saturday mornings after 9AM to get a tour of our firehouse and the equipment. We would be happy to answer any questions you might have. **A Fire Marshal's Report**

The holiday season will soon be upon us and the Brookhaven Fire Marshal's office is once again getting its message out about fire safety. The officers and members of the Brookhaven Fire Company would like to make sure every resident is SAFE and not affected by the tragedy of fire.

Listed below is a checklist to make sure all is safe during this coming season.

- **First and most important, make sure you change the batteries in your smoke CO2 detectors, and ensure they are working properly.** A smoke detector should be on every level of your dwelling, and building. Also a smoke detector must be in all sleeping areas. If they are more than 10 years old, replace them with new ones.
- **Check all electrical cords and lights to make sure they are not damaged.** If the cords are frayed or cracking, do not use them. Replace them with accessories that have the U.L. (Underwriters Laboratory) label. • **Do not overload electrical outlets with power strips.** Make sure that the electrical system can handle the load. Be sure extension cords do not run under rugs or furniture that could cause the cord to overheat.
- **NEVER leave a fireplace, wood stove or a pellet stove, unattended.** Allow time for the fire to burn itself out and leave the hot ashes in the fire box until the ashes have had at least a day to cool off. When removing the ashes, place them in a metal container to help prevent any re-ignition. If you are using any of the three mentioned above make sure your chimneys, flu pipes, are cleaned and inspected for cracks, so not to allow any smoke or CO2 into your house or building. If you still have a kerosene heater, get rid of it, throw it out.
- **During your fall cleaning, clean your dryer, dryer vent and hose to remove lint build up, this can also cause fire. • If you smell smoke, natural gas inside, or outside of your residents, or wherever you're at, do not hesitate to call 911.** In no way are you bothering the fire company, that's what we are here for. Also, you can dial 911 for anything. Don't ever feel embarrassed by doing so. It's better to be SAFE than sorry and really be embarrassed by not calling.

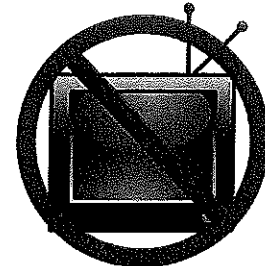

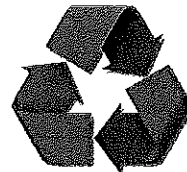

**RECYCLES – ALL RECYCLES MUST BE LOOSE IN A RECYCLE CONTAINER – not in plastic bags.** Brown paper bags, glass, cans, newspapers and cardboard are recyclables. **PLASTIC THAT IS MARKED WITH A DIAMOND 1, 2, OR 3 ARE ALSO RECYCLABELS.** Any cardboard that gets wet will be considered regular trash. Electronics recycling events will occur 3 times a year in 2019. Shredding events will occur 2 times a year. Keep an eye out on the borough calendar, TV channel, digital sign and borough website for the dates and times.

The Borough Council has decided to do street patch repairs vs full block paving projects this year, as we have numerous issues with the sanitary and storm sewers that lie beneath the roads, and determined it is not a good use of taxpayer monies to pave a street that may require destroying the paving to fix a sewer problem right after the paving is completed. Therefore, this year, we have done patch repairs to numerous locations throughout the Borough to address the worst conditions, and we will follow-up with a more robust paving program next year, after we fix some of the sewer issues. You have seen work on our Borough streets in the last few weeks. The Borough authorized a patching program, along with a pothole program to repair some roadways. We continue to monitor and fix infrastructure and will pave as Borough funds and conditions allow.

**Stormwater Management  
and  
How it Impacts Borough Residents**

**What is stormwater management?**

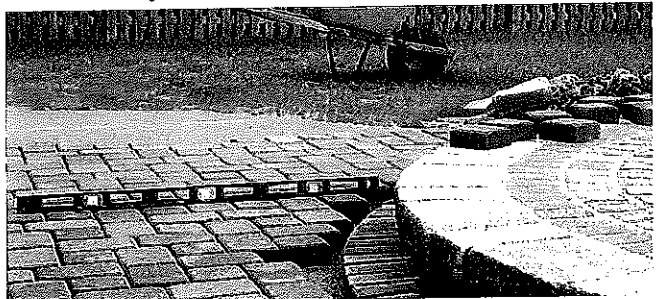
Stormwater management is the effort to reduce run-off of rainwater or melted snow onto streets, driveways, parking lots, and other sites and the improvement of water quality, according to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The federal government is imposing more stringent requirements and we are tasked with meeting these guidelines. The more we can voluntarily accomplish, the less the communities will need to expend taxpayer funds to be compliant. We are looking for all of us to be mindful and to help.

**So, how does stormwater management help?**

Impervious surfaces (hard surfaces, i.e., driveways, sidewalks, roads) prevent rain and snow melt from naturally soaking into the ground. Rain and snow melt both have pollutants in them that are gained as rain falls from rooftops, runs down driveways and roads with fuel and oil residue, etc. The polluted run-off then goes directly into storm sewers and reaches streams without the pollutants being removed. Both the quantity and quality of the run-off affect the conditions of the streams.

**How can we all help?**

Examining where rainwater falls on your property is the first step. Any rain that can be directed to grass rather than running down a paved surface is the best way to filter run-off. If your roof rainwater downspouts discharge to your driveway, redirect them using flexible pipe to discharge onto grass. Try to keep the discharge about 10 feet from your house to protect your foundation. Sometimes, rerouting the gutters so the downspout discharges to grass is the best solution. If you're considering reconstructing a patio or adding one, please consider using pavers, as they permit infiltration between the stones. Add a grass strip to the driveways, rather than an all-paved surface.



**Check your property after a rain event.**

Is there any area in your yard that is particularly wet? If water drains there, perhaps look into adding a rain garden. Not only will it add beauty to your yard, but it will help filter the rainwater.

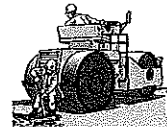


First, I would like to take the opportunity to thank my fellow residents for the vote of confidence me to

**In order to maximize our tax dollars when we pave, patch, and repair our streets, the borough now has a new policy.**

If a street is to be repaired or paved, the borough will now be televising these streets. Starting in 2019, before a borough street can be resurfaced/repared, it will be televised in order to determine if there is any underground damage and/or problems occurring beneath the street surface.

Resolving these underground problems will enable the borough to resolve these problems as soon as possible.

## **SNOW REMOVAL PROCEDURES**

The following are the procedures for snow removal. Please bear with us during snow storms. Thank you!

- When snow is predicted from a coating to two inches, it will be controlled by spreading de-icing materials.
- When a larger storm is predicted, some pre-salting of hills and curves will take place before the snowfall to prevent ice packing of those areas.
- After the snow falls, all streets will be salted to prevent snow from ice packing on the macadam.
- Plowing will start after 3 inches fall. Plowing will continue throughout the storm of all streets as snow accumulates 4-5 inches at a time. This process could take place numerous times until the storm stops. Snow will be pushed back as far to the curb line as possible.
- After the snow stops, final plowing will start. Snow will be pushed back as far as possible to the curb line in the event of another storm coming before present snow melts. After final plowing, all streets will be salted a final time.
- The first priority is the plowing of the main streets (most traveled), second will be the less traveled and third will be the circles.
- After the plowing and salting is finished, the residents or contractors who choose to throw snow back into the streets will be fined per Ordinance 680.06. The borough will not come back to remove any snow that was put back into the streets after plowing was completed.
